1 Course Description

This course aims to familiarize students with the issues of deprivation and distribution in the context of the Indian economy. The course offers an introduction to the different methods of understanding and conceptualising poverty. The course aims to cover the major debates on poverty measurement in India, including the recent debates on poverty measurement post-Covid.

In part-2 of this course, students will learn the latest developments in understanding the evolution of inequality, the statistical indices used to measure it, tracking its significant increase at a time of rapid growth in India. The course uses media such as documentaries and movies to briefly introduce the students to the issues of poverty and inequality that prevail in the Indian economy, including caste, class, and gender inequality. Through this course, the student will be introduced to the theoretical and empirical tools necessary to better understand the twin issues of poverty and inequality in India.

Dr. Prachi Bansal holds a Ph.D from Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi and is also a WID.world Fellow at the World Inequality Lab, Paris School of Economics. Her research areas include agriculture, inequality, labour, and technology. Her work examines how structural changes in the economy from agricultural transformation to the rise of artificial intelligence shape patterns of work, care, and welfare. She has collaborated with international organizations including the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) and the International Labour Organization (ILO) on projects concerning data anonymization, debt-bondage, and SDG indicators on labour and food security.

- **Duration:** 45 minutes for the presentation in class followed by questions.
- **Presentation Content:**
 - Analyzing key themes from the movie/documentary.
 - Connecting them with insights from the assigned papers.
 - **Questions:** Marks awarded for the ability to ask insightful questions (encouraging active engagement from all groups).
 - Group consists of 3 members **Q&A Participation**
 - **Audience Questions:** Each individual receives marks for asking questions during others' presentations. Each person must ask three **relevant** questions to get marks.
 - **Individual Answers:** Individual grade on how well students answer both audience and instructor questions after the presentation.
 - Grades will be given at the end of the course for this.

3. Quiz (20%)

- One **quiz** midway through the course to test foundational knowledge and key concepts.

4. Final Exam (50%)

- **End-of-semester exam** covering the core material from the entire course.
