China is the most important neighbour of India. The Indian media and academia are constantly focussed on every development Beijing undertakes. The existing border dispute, the Galwan Clashes of 2020 and the increasing Chinese influence in South Asia further complicates this relationship. There are a lot of studies which do focus attention on the foreign policy and bi-lateral developments of China.
