**COURSE DESCRIPTION (COURSE VISION):**

This course explores the theory and practice of constitutional litigation across Latin America. Focusing on key legal mechanisms such as *amparo*, *tutela*, and other constitutional remedies, students will examine how courts enforce constitutional rights and shape public policy, having an impact on issues that range from the students' right to pick their own hairstyle to the decriminalization of abortion. The course provides a comparative law perspective, highlighting regional variations and landmark decisions from the courts of Mexico, Colombia, Brazil, and Argentina. By the end of the course, students will be equipped to critically assess the impact of constitutional litigation on climate change disputes, reproductive rights, justice, and human rights across Latin America. The students will be able to assess the effectiveness and limitations of strategic constitutional litigation as a tool for advancing human rights and social justice from a global perspective, and apply doctrinal, theoretical, and comparative approaches to craft legal arguments and critique decisions in constitutional cases.

**TEACHING METHODOLOGY:**

**INTENDED LEARNING OUTCOMES:**

1. Explain the historical development, theoretical foundations, and procedural aspects of constitutional litigation in Latin America, with particular emphasis on *amparo*, *tutela*, and related remedies.
2. Assess the role of constitutional courts in shaping public debate and policy, including their influence on sensitive social issues such as abortion, freedom of expression, and minority rights.
3. Analyze landmark decisions from regional constitutional courts and assess their influence on public policy and protection of fundamental rights (e.g., reproductive rights, climate change, education, equality).

4. Compare and contrast constitutional litigation mechanisms across Mexico, Colombia, Brazil, and Argentina, identifying key similarities, differences, and innovations.
5. Evaluate the effectiveness and limitations of strategic constitutional litigation as a tool for advancing human rights, social justice, and systemic reform in Latin America.
6. Critique constitutional court decisions by engaging with their reasoning, social impact, and broader implications for democratic governance and separation of powers.
7. Engage critically with global perspectives on constitutional litigation, situating Latin American developments within broader transnational human rights discourse.
